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Identifying and Conveying Correct Information Responsibly

Just before the summer vacation, there was some concern about having a cooler summer, but just after the break began we were hit with several days of intense heat. And right before the grade 5 students were to leave for their Hakone Summer Camp, the No. 6 typhoon made landfall, potentially jeopardizing the trip. Despite the fickle weather, the Hakone Summer Camp went on as scheduled and there were 8 summer pool sessions.

At last, the second term has begun. During this time, I am reminded of an incident that happened when I was a principal at another school. 10 minutes into 5th period after recess, I was told by the principal of the neighboring kindergarten that parents had arrived to pick up their children because they heard there had been gunshots fired and the culprit was holed up at the apartment building across the street. We had not checked if the story was true, but since it could endanger the children, classes having PE in the schoolyard or observing plants on the balconies were quickly moved inside the school building. The curtains in the main building were closed and the students in the classrooms facing the apartment building were evacuated to another school building. After that, I went to check for any updates. There were several officers dispatched outside, so I identified myself to an officer who seemed to be giving orders and asked about the situation. They were told that shots had been fired, but since the police were still confirming the situation, I made the students wait where they were. What surprised me is what came afterwards. Even though we had not sent out a notice due to a lack of confirmation, one or two parents started coming to school, saying they heard about a shooting incident. In an instant, 10 more parents showed up. After about 20 minutes, I had heard from the police that the culprit had been apprehended, but there might be an accomplice, so the children should remain waiting at school. When I went to inform the parents in the entrance hall, one parent said they heard from another parent that the culprit had been arrested and everything was fine, and then the other parents started to disperse to go home. Surprised, I warned them that there might be another culprit and, for the children's safety, they should wait in their rooms until we know it is safe. That incident has been a constant reminder of the surprising speed that information travels, and how important it is for that information to be correct.

It is not rare for information to spread like that. Especially in this age with cell phones and smart phones, it is possible for countless people to receive information in an instant. When one person passes on information to their friend, that information can spread much farther than they could have imagined. And sometimes, someone can embellish the story they heard and it no longer resembles what the original person meant to convey.

Also, when people want to be heard or believed, they will say that it's not just them but other people saying the same thing, as if to validate their story. Often times those stories can influence others or cause trouble for others. A mistake like that could result in a crime or even violate someone's human rights.

When passing along information, people want to hear the truth, so there may or may not be a need to pass it on. When receiving information, people want the ability to check its source and decide on their own whether the information is true or false. I hope to impart that skill and sentiment to our students.
