After Sports Day

Last month, we held our Sports Day under sunny skies. As the temperature rose in the afternoon, the closing ceremony was held inside the students' tents to prevent heat stroke.

I believe we witnessed the results of the children's daily practices as they put all of their effort into their performances and competition. This year, we opened up some of the classrooms to offer more viewing spaces. We are glad that the event went off without a hitch, thanks to the cooperation of the PTA members. We appreciate everyone's understanding and cooperation.

The Tokyo Metropolitan Government designates June, November, and February as *Fureai* Months (Bullying Prevention Months), and I would like to introduce Higashimachi's anti-bullying measures.

First of all, it is important to recognize a child suffering physical or mental distress by someone's behavior as being bullied. We hold an evening meeting every Thursday to ensure that not only the child's teachers but also all faculty and staff members are aware of the children's situation. Next, once a month, the children answer a questionnaire about their time at school in order for us to grasp each child's situation, including early detection of bullying. Also, once a month, we set up a Human Rights Education Day to help students understand cultural differences through in-class instruction and school lunches from around the world.

Finally, twice a year, we invite outside experts such as lawyers, the PTA president, police, and community members to a meeting of Higashimachi's bullying and truancy prevention committee to discuss bullying from a broad perspective.

All faculty and staff members understand the definition of bullying and have a system in place to prevent even minor bullying from going unnoticed.
