It has been almost a month since the children entered school or moved up to their new grades. The first graders have gradually gotten used to school life and now play energetically during recess. Students in other grades are also showing a fresh, motivated attitude—calmly engaging in learning and physical activities, and enjoying their learning and physical activities, and enjoying their time with friends during breaks.

In April, I spoke to the children during the opening ceremony, entrance ceremony, and a school-wide morning assembly. I shared with them something I hope will become second nature: the three A's—
"aisatsu" (greetings), "arigatou" (thank you), and

These concepts help children learn to consider others and are foundational for building good relationships and living in society. It is said that children grow through interacting with others, and school is exactly the place where such interactions happen. Naturally, there are times when children argue or fight because they cannot express themselves well. But through this, they learn to understand each other, make compromises, reconcile, and build relationships. They also learn important values like being considerate, being patient, enduring difficulties, and the joy of working together with friends. School is, in a sense, a small society. There are many things that can only be learned and experienced in a group setting. I hope that through these interactions, and by being mindful of the three A's and the three I's by being mindful of the three A's and the three I's, our students will make many friends and grow as individuals.

Practice for the Sports Festival is also beginning. It is a great opportunity for children to learn the importance of teamwork and unity and to grow both physically and mentally. As we proceed, we will recognize and encourage each and every child. We kindly ask for your continued support in managing your child's health at home so they can come to school full of energy.

About the ESC Program

EST Naoko Murahashi

Currently, ten students from five countries are studying in the ESC (English Support Course). ESC students study math and English in separate classrooms with an EST (English Support Teacher), and for other subjects, they study with their classmates in the classroom while the EST interprets the lessons given by the homeroom teacher or specialist as needed.

Students learn math according to the Japanese curriculum using translated textbooks. During *kokugo* time, students study both English and Japanese (for Grades 1 and 2 only). In English classes, students learn language skills similar to those studied in *kokugo* in order to maintain English proficiency appropriate for their grade. In Japanese classes, students learn vocabulary and expressions necessary for school and daily life.

Our school provides an environment where students can develop the mindset and attitudes necessary for the global world of the future. We hope that all students will be proud of their own cultures as well as be able to understand, accept, and respect others and different cultures.
