While the mornings and nights remain cold, we can feel the arrival of spring in the warmth of the sun. It is the last month of the first Reiwa academic year, and cases of COVID-19 infections are spreading. On February 17<sup>th</sup>, the Ministry of Health, Labor, and Welfare issued a statement advising people who feel like they have cold symptoms like a fever to stay home from school and refrain from going outside; and if they show the following symptoms, then they should seek consultation from their local consultation center (帰国者・接触者相談センター):

- If you have a fever over  $37.5^{\circ}$ C (99.5°F) for over 4 days in a row
- If you have a strong feeling of weariness (fatigue) or shortness of breath (trouble breathing)

Also, it is predicted that school events might be affected by this; however, we must take adequate precautions to prevent further infections.

Moving on: When some incident occurs, how it is perceived or how it is emotionally process can be different for each person. If we present a glass of water, there will be people who will have very different ways of perceiving the glass, saying the glass is half full, or half empty, or there may even be people who will just be thankful that there is water in the glass. Sociologist P.F. Drucker is known for saying, "'The glass is half full' and 'The glass is half empty' are descriptions of the same phenomenon but have vastly different meanings [that] open up big innovation opportunities." Humans, as observers, can interpret things in different ways. A person's interpretation of events is largely affected by that person's way of life. When a phenomenon occurs, there are those who perceive it positively (optimists) or negatively (pessimists). So, depending on the observer, there are different ways to perceive things. The quality of life is also different between optimistic and pessimistic people. Pessimists tend not to trust their friends and believe that only bad things happen to them; however, optimists feel like they are surrounded by good friends and feel like a lot of good things happen in their lives. In the end, this all connects to one's quality of life. If one changes their negative perspective to one that is more positive, they will see a vast improvement in the quality of their life.

I hope the 6 graders graduating this March will set off on paths to fulfilling lives. The Grade 6 Send-Off Party will be March 3<sup>rd</sup> (Tues). Grades 1 to 5 will show their gratitude to the 6<sup>th</sup> graders through songs and special messages. Then, the 6<sup>th</sup> graders will debut their original song, "Happy End." It will be the final time they will show their talents to the student body. At the graduation ceremony on the 24<sup>th</sup> (Tues), the 5<sup>th</sup> graders will attend as representatives of the student body. There, they will inherit the baton of leadership from the graduates.

The 25<sup>th</sup> (Wed) is the Closing Ceremony for grades 1 to 5. We will help make use of each day to wrap up their studies and prepare for the following grade.
