## Educational Counselling February's Goal "Don't Let the Cold Beat You! Get Out and Move About!"

## **In-School Research and Development (Teacher Development)**

At Higashimachi, teachers are researching and developing skills in educating students to be independent and supportive learners via the writing lessons in *kokugo* class. Classes are conducting activities to increase their vocabulary with various activities like vocabulary trees as well as writing self-introductions and friend introductions.

The teachers have developed different approaches so that students will feel more motivated to write, and the students are able to share their ideas with their classmates and recognize good things in their writing. Many students who did not feel confident in the first term now find they can write more effectively.

We hope to use the results of this year's research in subsequent years to improve learning in other subjects and to better each student's learning.





## **Japanese Culture**

Higashimachi's promotion of Japanese culture understanding is part of its International Studies Program. The International Studies Program also includes the international studies classes, education in international understanding, cross-cultural education, and support for children of foreign nationalities.

Japanese culture classes include *shado* (tea ceremony), *taiko* (Japanese drum), and *shogi* (Japanese chess) conducted by instructors from the area, as well as *karuta*, *kendama*, *koma*, *hyakunin isshun*, and *shuji* (calligraphy) taught by the homeroom teachers.

This year, guest teachers from the local community taught classes to 5th and 6th graders. *Shado* was taught by Ms. Otsuka and Ms. Kaneko. *Taiko* by Ms. Noda and Ms. Komine. Shogi was taught by Sugimoto Sensei, Sugawara Sensei, Minagawa Sensei, and Aida Sensei.

The children showed great interest in the activities and had fun learning about them.



# **Educational Counselling and Advice**

This year, the school counsellors are available every Thursday (Counsellor Ikeda) and Friday (Counsellor Kamimura). We are happy to have students visit us whenever they want to.

At the counsellor's office, we listen to children's concerns and problems and can either help process their feelings or work towards a solution. If the children do not wish to talk about their problems, they can come to spend time comfortably by drawing pictures or folding origami. Some children may feel that just entering the counsellor's office takes a little courage, but we are always happy to welcome anyone who visits us.

School Counsellors at all Minato City elementary schools conduct individual interviews with all Grade 4 and Grade 5 students. Because of this, many students feel close to their school counsellor. Just by putting their feelings into words, students feel better about going back to class because they now have an idea on how to resolve issues with their classmates. To that effect, in the case of bullying, the counsellors can talk with the children involved as well as work with the classroom teachers and deal with the issue accordingly.

We also offer counselling to parents and guardians. Parents who are concerned about their child's behavior are welcome to contact the school counsellors. Those who wish to speak with a counsellor can first contact their child's classroom teacher, the school nurse, or the Vice Principal.

# Japanese Kanji Aptitude Test (Kanji Kentei)
