It is now the end of the academic year. Thank you all very much for your understanding and cooperation in our school's educational activities throughout the year. The next academic year will mark the 110th anniversary of the school's opening. The school's measures in response to COVID-19 will also change. We hope these changes will improve our school and make it a place that children can enjoy attending.

The main improvements are listed below. Everyone's cooperation in the coming school year will be greatly appreciated.

• Increased Number of Classes

We will have three new Grade 1 classes next year, which will make 16 classes for the first time at Higashimachi. However, there are no available classrooms. We will be renovating and building special classrooms to make room for the new classrooms next year. Therefore, in past years, the sixth grade has been in the annex (*shinkosha*), but from next year, due to the classroom arrangement, three classes will assigned there.

• Digital Versions of School Newsletters and Grade Newsletters

We plan to reduce the number of paper-based letters and notices. The April issue of the newsletters always contain a large amount of information and is a transitional period for everyone, so the April issue will be distributed in paper form; however, starting with the May issue, notices and letters will be published digitally and made available on the school's website. If you wish to continue to receive the paper version, please contact your new homeroom teacher for the next academic year.

• Taking Home the Tablets

We have received concerns that the tablets are heavy and difficult to take home every day, especially for the lower grade students. In an effort to lighten the weight of things students must bring and take home, the school will be more flexible about taking home the tablets every day.

• Entrances and Exits Used When Arriving and Leaving School

As the COVID-19 situation has improved, the service entrance that was used as an entrance and exit for students will be closed.

Changes in the Daily Schedule

A special Wednesday Schedule (B Schedule) will be established. Students will be dismissed from school 15 minutes earlier than other weekdays.

• Preparing for a Subject-Based Teacher System

As part of the transition to a subject-based teacher system, a home economics instructor will be assigned to the upper grades.
