Learning in the ESC Program

As of now, there are 17 students from 9 countries learning in the English Support Course (ESC). ESC students study math and language arts with their English Support Teacher (EST) and other subjects in their classrooms with their classmates (with the help of the EST).

In math class, ESCs use translated math textbooks and learn math based on Japan's national curriculum. During language classes (*kokugo*), they study Japanese and English. To preserve the students' English abilities and keep them at the same level as their counterparts in English-speaking countries, topics and skills learned in these classes resemble those in Japan's *kokugo* class. In Japanese class, students start studying greetings, hiragana, and katakana, and learn phrases and expressions that are useful for their time at school.

Higashimachi is ripe with a philosophy of global education that provides all students with the skills and attitude necessary to participate in the global society of the future. We hope all students will take pride in their own country's culture while recognizing and respecting the differences in other people's cultures.

Applying for Smile Room and Special Assistance

Higashimachi has hosted the special Smile Room classes for students who are concerned about their studies as well as their school life. Also, parents may apply for the on-going program that assigns a special instructor to join their child's class and offer individual assistance if they wish to do so (beginning in the second term of 2023).
